# **ONCE UPON A TIME THERE WAS, A RIVER...**



On one side the Mont Lozère, on the other the Garonne... And in the middle flows a river, the Lot. Its Valley, like a long blue ribbon, weaves a unique strand of heritage, of culture and tourism which has developed across 5 départements, for you to explore at every meander of the river.

At the place where it all begins, the Mont Lozère... a humble source which springs from the earth at an altitude of 1,241 metres, amidst wild flowers and spruces. At its finish, the Garonne, opulent and proud, the last leg before the ocean: the Lot has its mouth at Aiguillon. Between the two ends, the river flows turbulently over more or less 500 km... The Valley, such lovely a journey through all sorts of countryside: the high plateaux of the Aubrac, which look like the Mongolian steppes; the dense forests of Margeride, haunted by the memory of the beast of Gévaudan; emerald lakes, created by dams; steep-sided gorges, which take themselves for canyons; the rich plains of the Aquitaine, with their vineyards and orchards...

The Valley, is a fabulous journey back in time: from the prehistoric caves of Pech Merle to the mining basin of Decazeville, what a Story! Fortified châteaux and proud country houses which tell the tale of the Hundred Years War; Romanesque churches, sculpted like jewellery, which still resound with the ardour of the pilgrims of Saint-Jacques; the little river ports, living proof of the boldness of the boatmen of times gone by, who, with their barges laden with wood and coal would make their way to Bordeaux.

Here's a summary: In 1926, The Lot is struck off the list of navigable waterways. Little by little it loses its status of communication route. The 1960s see the decline of the Decazeville and Fumel industrial basins. So is the Valley becoming a Sleeping Beauty?

'Let's do a little bit of the river together': there is a clamour for real solidarity all the way from the source down to the mouth of the river, notably around tourism, which has been a factor in its development. 1969 sees the creation of the Association for the Development of the Lot valley, led by Christian Bernad with 5 départements involved: it brings together all those involved with the basin, the councillors, guild chambers, tourist boards, fishermen, navigation professionals, electricity providers... The first projects take shape around the redevelopment of the river to make it navigable once more.

1980 sees the birth of the Entente Vallée du Lot which, administered by 25 councillors, takes up the torch. Its task: to continue the economic, environmental, tourist and hydraulic development of the Valley.

The stakes are high: to turn the Valley into a thriving and dynamic basin for its inhabitants but also for tourists attracted by the fabulous potential that it has to offer. The environment is also a key word, with the need to improve the management and quality of the water.

Today, the Lot is once again navigable over virtually 150 km running through the départements of the Lot and the Lot et Garonne (The Aveyron département should open its first 14km long section by 2011) and river tourism is booming, thanks to the junction with the Baïse and the Canal des Deux Mers. Another tourist success story: the cycle-route, which links Aiguillon to Bonaguil and goes on as far as Cahors alongside the river. After 40 years of hard work the Lot Valley is on the point of becoming The tourist destination not to be missed.

# The heritage card

Once upon a time...

The castle that every child dreams about? Bonaguil.

One of the most beautiful prehistoric caves in France ? Pech-Merle.

A jewel of Roman art? Conques.

An exceptional village, perched on its rock? Saint-Cirq-Lapopie.

No you're not dreaming!

All that really does exist, at various points along the Lot valley. The valley of Marvels.

Romanesque châteaux, country houses, abbeys and churches, prehistoric sites, towns and villages full of character: the banks of the Lot valley are filled with some quite exceptional heritage. It is the fruit of a variety of lands and scenery: the rich plains and slopes of the Garonne region, the barren and stark plateaux of the Quercy, the tortuous gorges of the Auvergne and the Gévaudan, The granite massif of the Margeride... And the Aubrac, of course, this vastness positioned on a plateau, forgotten by mankind, which displays its pastures and its burons (stone huts) with their corbelled slate roofs. An heritage which evokes the arrival of the first human settlers, in locations which seemed to them idyllic; the Hundred Years war and the creation of the fortified towns , these new towns of the Middle Ages; the faith of the pilgrims on their way to Saint-Jacques de Compostelle; the bravery of the boatmen who would risk their lives plying the river to transport wood, wines and cereals; the tenacity of the miners of Decazeville, who relentlessly mined the coal from depths of the earth.

So what is the Lot Valley? Well it's a very beautiful book of History to leaf through on your way down the river.

### **Its châteaux**

Medieval fortresses, defensive châteaux or pleasure residences, from Bonaguil to Cénevières, they inspire dreams...

### Its villages & fortified towns

They are called Villeneuve-sur-Lot or Monflanquin; they have names like Saint-Cirq-Lapopie or Estaing... All of them reflections of a certain art of living.

### The Romanesque art

First of all Conques la merveille. Then the churches of the Pays d'Olt in its red sandstone, La Canourgue and its capitals, Sainte-Urcize... Stunning!

### Château de Bournazel (12)

Italian. Worthy of the châteaux du Val de Loire, Bournazel is a little gem! Built in 1545, this pleasure retreat is a treasure from the Renaissance. The façade of the north wing alone is worth making time to visit: columns, pilasters, friezes, males masks, imaginary characters... a real stone theatre. New from summer 2010, visit the interior of the castel. It's beautiful and it's new!

### Château d'Estaing (12)

### Château de Peyrusse-le-Roc (12)

Two towers all on their own on a granite outcrop: the place cuts a fine figure! The site was a major stronghold.

Ruins, a rocky footpath, a medieval garden: enough to do wonders for the imagination.

### Château de Roquelaure (12)

At the heart of a little village in the Pays d'Olt, a château in ruins which almost disappeared. A couple of enthusiasts gave a new lease of life to the three towers and to the main body of the building which goes back to the 11th century.



### Château de Cénevières (46) Perched. Looking out over the Lot

Perched. Looking out over the Lot, Cénevières is startling: a part fortified in the Middle-Ages hides a true Renaissance palace. # Guided tours

### Château de Bonaguil (47)

This is THE castle, The one that you dream about as a child, with knights everywhere. And yet, for the most part it dates back to the beginning of the 16th century: a powerful and mysterious lord, Bérenger de Roquefeuil, struggled all his life to fortify it, at the time of the golden age of the Renaissance châteaux. Towers, turrets, a chicane, a large barbicane,

drawbridges and a complete defence mechanism built around artillery... which was never to be used!

### Château de Calmont-d'Olt (12)

Do you know what a Couillard (catapult) is ? Have you ever used a crossbow? Or seen a catapult being used ? And a bombarde ? The Middle-Ages war almost for real, this is at Calmont d'Olt. This 11th Century fortress perched on a

basalt peak, still has some beautiful remains: interior, towers, dungeon, main building. The ideal

setting to recreate the siege of a castle: demonstrations of military machines, jousting between knights, archery or crossbow, coin minting workshops...

### Château de Vieillevie (15)

A village in the Châtaigneraie, which has something of the south about it with its cherry orchards, and a sturdy château, brimming with history. This one goes back

### Château du Colombier (12)

Welcome to the ancestral home to the last 30 Generations of Panouse counts : yes, that's right they were the founders of the Thoiry wildlife park near to Paris.

Le Colombier is its little brother: a 15th century château, with wax characters and period furniture; and gardens which whisk you back to the heart of the Middle Ages, withits tinctorial plants and its labyrinth of chivalrous love.

And of course, our animal friends, those which were

known in the Middle-Ages: Messire Brown bear, the Lion king, birds of prey and monkeys.

# The Pays d'Olt



### Saint-Eulalie d'Olt (12)

Well done to the inhabitants for restoring the half-timbered houses of their listed medieval town "one of the most beautiful villages in France". From the elegance of The Hôtel Renaissance to its 17th century mill the commune supports the spirit of the village and to revive the regional arts and crafts industry it founded the Small Arts School, with workshops open all year (with lessons and courses ) Tourist Office: 05 65 47 82 68

### Saint-Côme d'Olt (12)

Such is the Pilgrim, don't count your steps here! You enter this listed village "one of the most beautiful villages in France" by the Théron fortified door. Then you plunge into the Middle Ages through a maze of Little streets lined with town houses with sandstone roofs. On top of that its spired bell tower. Tourist Office: 05 65 48 24 46

### Saint-Geniez d'Olt (12)

Formerly a major hub for tanners and drapers, the village has preserved its 18th century hotels and prestigious religious monuments. The Augustins cloister and its 14th century chapel as well as the Pénitents-Noirs one of 17th century are a few examples.

### From Entraygues to Espalion

Left bank, right bank of the Lot, these character villages leave their mark. You'll appreciate the old tanneries, the Vieux Palais d'Espalion, the beautiful houses and the Collège around the château d'Estaing or even the medieval bridges and the chapel of Notre-Dame du Portet d'Entraygues.

### The Valley of Célé

### Marcilhac-sur-Célé (46) :

overlooked by cliffs, a fine collection of Renaissance houses snuggling around a Benedictine abbey church in ruins: back in the 11th century it was almost as important as Conques!

Espagnac-Sainte-Eulalie (46) : former priory from the 13th century and its wooden bell tower really adds to the charm of this village, giving it the air of a little paradise. Stopover gîte for the jacquaires pilgrims in the priory. Tel. 05 65 11 42 66.

From Laguiole (12), a village famous for its knives and its factory, reviewed and remodelled by Philippe Stark, we go on to reachNasbinals (48) and Saint–Urcize (15) where we visit their Romanesque churches (cf Roman art) passing along the way through the village of Aubrac, which is one of the stages along the St Jacques de Compostelle paths.

Marvejols (48) A gallo-roman menhir, with superb 17th century fortified doors, its collegiate church Notre Dame de la Carce from the 13th century, the royal town of the Gevaudan is also the epicentre of occitane culture. ### Heart of the Lot Valley

**Saint-Cirq Lapopie (46):** A gem! The location, on a balcony above a bend in the river Lot. The blond stone houses and blonde and red roofs, nestling around the church. The sloping little streets, lined with mossy walls. The terraces, capped with wisteria, where it's lovely just catching the sun. The craftsmen's workshops, set up in the medieval stalls. André Breton had his house there.

### Lower Valley of the Lot

The Lot settles down, it has ever more meanders to it, there are more and more ports; a land of vineyards and orchards that's the Aquitaine Lot.

**Puy-L'Evêque (46)** Standing on the left bank of the Lot, it was a very bustling and prosperous port. It has still kept some of its picturesque little streets, lined with Renaissance houses, chapels, 14th century Gothic building.

**Luzech (46)** A quite exceptional site: the cité is like a peninsular, set in a very tight bend on the Lot. Everything there reminds you of the life of the boatmen, the picturesque little streets and the chapel with votive offerings. Tourist Office: 05 65 20 17 27

### Penne d'Agenais (47)

On its spur, the cité defied both Simon de Montfort and the English. The air is thick with History: fortified doors, little streets with their steps, timber framed houses. Some fine restaurants and master craftsmen. Tourist Office: 05 53 41 37 80.

**Pujols (47)** Yet another village with a view! A little gem above the valley of the Lot, this most beautiful of French villages has kept its medieval heritage intact. A farmer's market in the wooden market hall. Tourist Office: 05 53 36 78 69

**Clairac (47)** A port which was in use in the 18th century, has kept its boatmen and Coopers' houses, tobacco driers, a pretty washing fountain. Above the Lot. Montesquieu was a fan of all these places. OT : 05 53 88 71 59

### The Bastides

These are the new towns of the Middle ages, concentrated in the South-west, with their grid pattern, central square lined with arcades and governed autonomous consuls.

### Villeneuve-sur-Lot (47)

In all its splendour on the banks of the Lot, this river fortified town was built by Alphonse de Poitiers, brother of Saint Louis, in the 13th century. It has since lost its fortifications, but kept its towers, one of which is the Pujols tower, its timber framed houses and its central square, lined with leafy canopies or arcades. It's here that a lovely market is open for business on Tuesdays and Saturday mornings. A contemporary of the Pont Valentré de Cahors, the Pont-Vieux makes along with the Boutdu-Monde chapel a perfect postcard. Villeneuve is also the prune capital. www.villeneuve-sur-lot.com

### TOP 5 towns

### CAHORS (Lot)

In a meander of the Lot, the Lot's little beauty. It cuts a fine figure, with its arcade houses, bricks and timber frames, its cathedral and its Valentré bridge (both of which are UNESCO world heritage sites).

Here's a good idea: try exploring it as you make your way through its secret gardens, recent creations, quite out of the ordinary and in different colours. Tourist Office: 05 65 53 20 65

### **FIGEAC (Lot)**

A real history book, that you can thumb through whilst on the banks of the Célé: an abundance of brick and timber framed façades, of Renaissance decoration, secret courtyards. It's also the home of Champollion, with the house where he was born. New: an exciting guided tour on the theme of the 5 senses. Tourist Office: 05 65 34 06 25

### MENDE (Lozère)

The capital of the Gévaudan brushes shoulders with the Cévennes. It's history goes back to the Middle Ages, with its cathedral like Gothic vessel, its houses with their projecting stories and its 13th century bridge. It's also known for its sport, being used to hosting several marathons and enduro. For the second time, 14th july 1995 and 16th july 2010, Mende is the city stage of Tour de France. ### **SAINT-FLOUR (Cantal)**

Built on a spur, the medieval city "Land of art and history" is imposing with its Gothic cathedral and its lava buildings. For lovers of old stone work, a treat: Renaissance façades and courtyards, medieval stalls and an indoor market set up in a former collegiate church. Tourist Office: 04 71 60 22 50

### VILLENEUVE-SUR-LOT (Lot-et- Garonne)

A choice holiday destination with its water sports centre, a distinctive heart to the town and some pretty places to visit, such as its stud farm or the Gayac mill, the museum of Fine-Arts, (see alongside at Bastide). Office: 05 53 36 17 30

### Monflanquin (47)

Remarkably well preserved, with its orthogonal squared layout, and its square with leafy canopies. Pick any carreyrou, (little street), and you might come across Janouille, the funny old troubadour jester : just follow him, he's the best guide for the city! Around about: the fortified towns of Tournon d'Agenais, Villeréal, Laparade ...

### And also:

**Lot :** Montcabrier, such a pretty village and the 14th century Saint-Louis church; Castelfranc and its garden of fragrances.

**Aveyron:** Villecomtal in red sandstone and the land of Enfarinats: at the beginning of the 19th century, people would powder their hair with flour as a sign of fidelity to the old Régime !

## Romanesque art 🦓

Take your time as the pilgrims would have done to head to Saint Jacques de Compostelle and this is where you can start to find out about romanesque art. It will guide you from church to church as you contemplate the rich frescoes carved into the stone of the tympanum and the marquees. With as the jewel in the crown, Conques and its fabulous treasure.

### Conques

At the crossing of the gorges de l'Ouche with the valley of the Dourdou, in a natural crater in the shape of a seashell the medieval village comes into view, a Mecca for romanesque art. Its half-timbered corbelled houses huddle around its church.

For centuries the Romanesque abbey church has been a subject of conversation. Begun in 1040, and finished in 1120, it became a "a stopover church" on the road between Le Puy/St Jacques de Compostelle until the 14th century.

Left to decay during the Revolution, it was in 1837 that the commune entrusted an architect from Rodez with its demolition.Prosper Mérimée who was a minister at the time, objected, and got it listed as a historic monument and in doing so saved its tympanum sculpted in the 12th century. The restoration work began and was finished in 1950.

In 1994, it was made even more beautiful with the addition of white stained glass which makes it possible to play around with the architecture of the basilica by filtering the light from outside.

### Its treasure, jewel in time

Arising from the generosity of the emperors and Carolingian princes, the richness of the treasure became even more so in 866 from the relics of the Sainte Foy then throughout the Middle Ages from the donations from pilgrims. From the 10th century, reliquaries are fashioned at Conques using precious metals, Antique hard stones, pearls and gems. The Majesty of Sainte Foy, a reliquary statue designed to contain the saint's head is the most impressive piece of work. A unique item, one of the greatest examples of medieval silversmith's art in France.

### Did you know

Every year, more than 400,000 visitors stop over in the medieval village in the Aveyron, which is rated as one of the most beautiful villages in France and whose abbey church is a UNESCO world heritage site.
